Used Fuel Bills

- Arkansas – Passed a nuclear recycling bill
- Wyoming – Nuclear interim repository bills died
- Montana – Passed bills to allow for nuclear used fuel and enrichment facilities in the state
- Nevada – Regularly passes resolutions opposed to Yucca Mountain
- Michigan – Regularly passes resolutions calling on Congress to resolve the nation's used fuel issue
- Texas and New Mexico – Passed bills to prohibit CIS
